#### See You There!

We are aiming for a community that functions well remotely. Include those who cannot travel. Reduce the travel of those who can. This is part of the CMIW vision. It is one of the reasons we started this email newsletter. We need simple ways to communicate with each other.

But the vision also calls for some face-to-face meetings, which can be essential to good remote working. We like meeting face-to-face! It takes a lot of money (meeting venues and travel

costs). It takes lots of time (booking the flights, packing, travel time, waiting around in airports, unpacking, meetings). But some things happen when you meet face-to-face that do not happen when we email or talk on the phone. The apostle John knew this. He wrote, "I have much to write to you, but I do not want to use paper and ink. Instead, I hope to visit you and talk with you face to face, so that our joy may be complete." (2 John 1:12)

So what shall we do? Can we do anything without taking up more of your valuable time and money? We want to start by making the most of existing opportunities for face-to-face contact. So we are launching, "See You There!"

If you are prepared to take responsibility for setting up and facilitating an informal meeting of mission information workers at the conference, then let us know. # Holding you in our hearts...and in our database Chris Mayard

We try to be very conscious of security. That is one of the reasons we want you to know about the data we hold for you. At the moment an entry in our database contains the following fields:

- First Name: Chris- Last Name: Maynard

- **Email:** Chris.Maynard@transforminginformation.com

- Alternate Email: (If we know one, we record it and it is useful when the first one breaks.)
- Other Contact: Phone, Skype: ChrisMaynard3

- Country: UK

- **Location:** High Wycombe, Buckinghamshire (Sometimes this is a full address, especially if people include that in their email signature)
- Organisation: Transforming Information, WEA Mission Commission
- Other Information including Jobs and Roles (relatively static info): Info Mgmt Consultant. Transforming Information Ltd. is his own company. Was in JIMI Task Force. (This can be quite narrative. Usually things of current relevance. This could help us to put individuals in contact with one another although I don't think we have used it like that yet.)
- **Contact Status:** (Blank is normal. Other values so far are: "Dodgy email", "Broken email", "Removed")
- Log of Changes, Communication and Transient Things: 2012-06 added organisation and role. Original source: Ethne09 & Memberdata (This is mainly stuff that is not interesting unless we have to track back for some reason. Here we put a record of requests to join, emails that bounced and changes made to the data.)

The master list is a private document on the worksmail.net domain hosted securely by Google Educational Apps. Only 4 of us have access and we know each other well. Only one of us takes copies for backup purposes onto one secure computer.

For any one person, many of the fields are blank, but we fill things in as we learn more. Usually we learn from your emails (especially your "signature"), sometimes from the web or personal contact.

We expect to keep removed entries, partly to make sure we don't add people to the list who have asked to be removed. But if you ask us to delete all your data we will. For a few of you we also have the answers to a short questionnaire that we ran in our April 2012 newsletter.

We could keep you on the email list with just an email address and a few notes in the "Log of Changes". We are prepared to do this if you wish, but it will make it difficult to get to know you and to help you in other ways. We see this community developing beyond just an email newsletter, as we shared with you in the early editions. So we want to know something about our members.

# How do urban centers influence their adjacent rural communities?

In April Doug Lamp of Sepal in Brazil wrote us the following:

About 600 leaders gathered for 5 days of interaction and challenge to consider the evangelism and church planting needs of the immense and dry hinterlands of Brazil's northeast region, known as the "Sertão". At the onset of the conference a battle cry was sounded to plant 10,000 churches over the next ten years in the many rural towns and villages of this neglected region. Logistical problems, beyond just spiritual needs, related to accomplishing this challenge quickly became

apparent during this conference. Updated research is needed to more accurately define the location of these churchless communities and to better understand to what extent rural areas are being influenced by the adjacent urban populations. Research tools for onsite surveys of physical and social needs in these communities would enable church planters to contextualize evangelism and church planting strategies. OCI and its Brazilian mission counterpart, SEPAL, is committed to assist ministries of this region to develop survey tools and to update research on the communities of this region.
