Mission Information Workers (MIW) Conference Report by Chris Maynard

The second MIW Virtual Conference in April provided another cost-free, online experience where people can register and attend without financial or time commitment of a face-to-face meeting. So it was that we had nearly 400 registrants and 180 active participants, about half of whom attended for at least three of the eight hours of the conference.

We certainly "welcomed and encouraged each other!" The meeting room was open 30 minutes before and after the conference for people to gather, meet and interact. This open



discussion time was especially lively at the end of each day, stimulated by what had been presented.

It was good, as was the case in the virtual conference of September last year, to be able to have interpretation into Portuguese, and in one of the after-sessions we all benefitted from some impromptu interpretation from Portuguese into English.

The three main themes were "Regional People Group Data & Gaps," "Unifying Missions Data," and "Building Research Capacity." Each of them is a key theme, and none of them will progress very far without cooperative work – reaching across our organisational boundaries.

Back in September we had thought that we might run one of these conferences every six months. In the lead up to this second one, the organising team realised that it will be better to leave twelve months to allow for other cooperative activities to happen in between. It is our desire that more specific work can be carried out in the interval. Whether that happens or not remains to be seen. The next general MIW virtual conference like this one is likely to happen around the same time next year.

Finally here is some feedback from our post-conference survey. I chose four people at random from the 44 who gave us written feedback (unbiased). Here are the best bits from their comments (biased).

"I especially liked the Story Telling and Information and Prayer sessions."

"I was so happy to see the international nature of participants."

"Organizing [a] conference like this will be very helpful especially for the front line missionaries, for effectiveness."

"The room for participation was great."

A topic that recurred in the comments was about the challenge we have of catering for such a diverse audience, but on average 36 people found each session valuable, and only three did not (among those who answered those questions). Several people told us of technical difficulties connecting with the conference, or of clashes with other commitments. Many appreciated that recordings are available for them to recap, and to view sessions that they missed.

Indeed, all of the formal sessions are now available on CMIW's YouTube channel, along with recordings from last year. Each conference is grouped as a "playlist", but you can select an individual session to listen to. (If you are busy, you can even listen at a higher speed!). 1) [CMIW] Please tell us about yourself and your family.

I was born into a missionary-pastor family. So, I grew up following my father to rural communities where he was reaching the lost. I enjoyed the ride on his old rugged motorcycle but I was not really sure if I wanted to follow in his steps. I wanted to study hard, get a good job and at most be a mission supporter. I have my bachelors in Dramatic Theory and Criticism as well as Masters and PhD degrees in Intercultural Studies. I am married to Adebukola and blessed with three growing kids. We make our home in North-central Nigeria.

2) [CMIW] What is your current ministry?

I began my missionary service with my local denomination; an opportunity that took me across people groups in Nigeria, Republics of Benin and Niger. I joined the national missions network of my home country, the Nigeria Evangelical Missions Association (NEMA) about ten years ago. I have had the privilege of serving as the Academic Dean of the Nigeria Evangelical Missionary Institute and NEMA's Head of Publications. I also served as the Director of Research and Strategy and currently I head the Finance and Administration Department. Serving in NEMA is a huge privilege, quite laborious but deeply fulfilling.

3) [CMIW] What are the contributions you have made to world missions that have brought you the greatest satisfaction?

It's really exciting to be part of the global missions movement that is committed to ensuring that no people, place, language nor person is left. I recall, a few years back, when the leadership of NEMA took the challenge of delisting Nigeria from countries with unengaged peoples. I was part of a small team that was saddled with the responsibility of ensuring that this goal is met. To the glory of God and as far we have tracked, there are currently no unengaged peoples in the country. We are now believing God to ensure that no unreached people group is left. This experience and more strengthened my heart for the possibility of finishing the task.

4) [CMIW] What dreams do you have for your next ten years of ministry?

I just long to see many more peoples, languages and nations especially among the remaining unreached and unengaged peoples come to the saving grace of the Lord Jesus. My heart yearns to see movements of obedient disciples particularly in places and among peoples that continue to resist the Good News. I long to see the Light flood every dark corner of the earth.

5) [CMIW] Is there some way you'd be willing to help the CMIW community?

Being part of the CMIW community has been a huge blessing to my life and ministry. I have learnt a lot from others across the globe. I will be happy to be part of initiatives of establishing or strengthening national missions information work. I will also be happy to make contributions to closing gaps in regional data.

"When I heard these things, I sat down and wept. For some days I mourned and fasted and prayed before the God of heaven." Nehemiah 1:4

Hanani and some men had brought unpleasant information to Nehemiah. The news was devastating but Nehemiah's immediate response is worth learning from. **He prayed**! We are not lacking in mission information, we are simply lacking in the appropriate response. Mission information is not an end in itself; it must lead us, first, to the place of seeking God's face. That is the reasonable thing to do. If a little more of the time and energy spent in analysing and strategising on research reports may only be deployed into prayers,

we probably would be close to finishing by now. That is why as a community of mission information workers, "we want to live up to these God-given responsibilities – prioritizing prayer; praying ourselves and facilitating prayer through information."
